

## Workshop Descriptions

### 1. American Indian Discovery Tour

This tour introduces participants to North Carolina's early American Indians. Workshop participants will handle reproduction artifacts to learn about everyday life in North Carolina's many tribes.



### 2. The Story of the Lake Phelps Canoe and Canoe Paper Model Making

Junior historians will examine the museum's 2,500-year-old canoe and then fold a paper version to take home.



### 3. Medicinal Herbs

Students will hear Lumbee tribal member Mary Sue Locklear speak about traditional and modern uses of plants and herbs. They will explore medicinal herbs in the exhibit Health and Healing Experiences in North Carolina and put together a sassafras tea bag to take home.

### 4. The Three Sisters

Junior historians will hear the story of the Three Sisters (corn, beans, and squash) and learn how to plant a Three Sisters garden from members of the Sappony tribe.

### 5. Powwow: The Heartbeat of a People

Tour the Powwow exhibit and see how modern American Indians celebrate, dance, and make music. See how the influences of many tribes have merged into modern powwow culture.

### 6. Beadworking and Regalia Designs



Junior historians will examine beadwork by members of the Coharie and Haliwa-Saponi tribes, and then they will have a chance to create their own small beaded items.

### 7. American Indian Pottery

Senora Lynch of the Haliwa-Saponi tribe will demonstrate traditional pottery and then will show junior historians how to make their own clay turtles.

## 2006 Annual Convention

The Tar Heel Junior Historian Association's 2006 Annual Convention on April 28 celebrates American Indians in North Carolina. We'll be welcoming American Indians from four tribes who will entertain and educate while they share their culture and talents.

Advisers can choose from a variety of workshops. Junior historians will hear the story of the Three Sisters (corn, beans, and squash) and learn how to plant their own Three Sisters garden from Michelle Epps and Jean Williams, members of the Sappony tribe. Freeman Owle, from the Eastern Band of the Cherokee Indians, will display his stone-carving talents while he tells traditional stories. Students will learn about medicinal plants and herbs from a Lumbee Indian, Mary Sue Locklear, and make a sassafras tea bag to take home. Pat Richardson, from the Haliwa-Saponi tribe, will demonstrate her beadworking skills and lead participants in making their own bracelets. Junior historians will enjoy watching potter Senora Lynch (Haliwa-Saponi) while she creates a clay turtle and instructs them on making their own.

Every effort will be made to get your

club members into the workshops you have requested. Please attend all of your scheduled workshops; the presenters work very hard, and many will travel long distances for this event.

This year, Museum of History Director Betsy Buford has generously offered to provide lunch for everyone attending the convention, including students, teachers, parents, bus drivers, and volunteers. Lunch will be catered by Ron's Barn. See page 2 for the full menu.

Please register early for the convention! Space is limited, and club registrations will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis. Clubs may attend all or part of the convention; please let us know if you will not be attending the workshops or the Awards Ceremony. Although we are happy to see parents and grandparents, please remember that workshops are primarily for junior historians and their advisers.

Registration forms for the convention must be postmarked by Friday, April 14, or faxed by 4:00 p.m. on Friday, April 14. Art Contest entries must be registered at the museum by 10:00 p.m. on April 28.

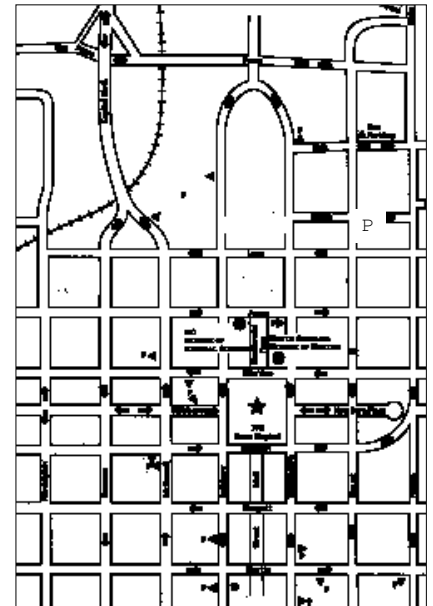
**The spring 2006 issue of the *Tar Heel Junior Historian* magazine on Immigration and Migration in North Carolina should be ready for mailing in mid-May!

## Parking

Parking is available in downtown Raleigh at designated visitor lots at a cost of \$0.50 per hour or \$4.00 per day. These lots are at the corner of Wilmington and Jones streets (behind the North Carolina Museum of History); on Hillsborough and Edenton streets between McDowell and Salisbury streets; on McDowell Street just past the intersection with Edenton Street; at the corner of Morgan and McDowell streets; on Salisbury Street just past the intersection with Hargett Street; and on Wilmington Street just past the intersection with Martin Street. These lots are marked on the map below.

All buses must park in the bus lot at the corner of Polk and Blount streets (see map).
